Capturing Feeding Activities During the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency

April 21, 2020 UPDATED August 11, 2020

UPDATED October 2020 (Consumable Supplies Definition aligned with Standard Definition in 20-PI-10)

At this time, when reporting activities, aging network staff should first consult standard definitions of services and use your best judgment to select the appropriate service type. When new tools and direction are shared, the intent is to provide assistance in response to questions and provide clarity for moving forward in reporting activities. Past reporting entries do not need to be amended in order to align with the new information. Therefore, it is not required to change reporting entries already made into the Statewide Client Data System.

This updated Feeding Activities document contains a new service type, Consumable Supplies. Consumable Supplies fills a gap which had existed in available service types and enables reporting of essential disaster relief activities undertaken by the network. Consumable Supplies will remain as a permanent service type which will continue to be available after the COVID-19 pandemic to be used for both disaster and non-disaster provision of items of basic necessity. The formal service definition is as follows:

Consumable Supplies

<u>Definition</u>: Purchase of consumable supplies or material aid to meet basic necessities to benefit an older adult and/or their family caregiver. The supplies or material may include, for example, groceries, cleaning supplies, masks, gloves, continence items, personal hygiene supplies (including soap, toothpaste, toilet paper, sanitary wipes, incontinence supplies), cell phone access or internet access.

Unit: Activity

Note: ADRC Coronavirus Preparedness and Response Supplemental Appropriations Act funds can be used for consumable supplies and are not limited by age.

Feeding Activities

The table below is designed to assist in the determination of how to categorize and record feeding activities and related disaster relief services during the COVID-19 public health emergency.

Meals to Individuals Under Age 60

The table below is designed to assist in the determination of what funding to utilize when serving meals to individuals under 60 years of age during the COVID-19 public health emergency.

If Under 60 Meal would <u>not</u> have been able to be funded with state/federal funds before the public health emergency because the individual is:

- Individual under 60 with disabilities who does not live with a Home Delivered Meals recipient.
- Individual under 60 with disabilities who does not live in a housing facility occupied primarily by older individuals at which congregate meals are provided.

Then can serve meal through NY Connects (reported through NY Connects) and use ADRC Coronavirus Preparedness and Response Supplemental Appropriations Act funds

Do <u>not</u> use NY Connects EE or NY Connects EE - ILC funds

Should not use traditional state/federal funds and associated COVID stimulus funds (unless eligible as in row above)

NSIP Ineligible
