**I. Purpose**

The purpose of this Program Instruction is to transmit the application for funding, budget and program guidelines for implementation of the Older Americans Act, Title III, Part F, Disease Prevention and Health Promotion Services. This Title is contained in Sections 361 to 363, as amended, of the Act.

**II. Background**

In 1991, the United States House of Representatives Committee on Education and Labor in report #102-99, entitled Older Americans Act Amendments of 1991, October 1991, pp. 64-67 stated that "Older Americans can benefit significantly from health promotion and disease prevention programs. Participation in such programs can both increase the quality of life and reduce their need for expensive medical treatment services".

"There is a great need to increase older Americans access to and participation in prevention and health promotion activities. Some senior centers, and congregate meals programs funded through the Older Americans Act are providing these services, but only on a very limited and inconsistent basis. The Committee finds that these programs, as well as others funded by the Older Americans Act, are ideally suited for the provision of health promotion programs because so many older people are reached by them each day."

Title III-F was added to the Older Americans Act when the Act was amended in 1987. However, SOFA did not receive a Title III-F allotment until the end of FFY 1992. Receipt of this allotment has now permitted SOFA to begin providing Title III-F funding to the Area Agencies.

### **III. Program Guidelines**

The total available dollars for this new funding source is relatively small in comparison to the need and potential scope of programs that could participate. Consistent with the Older Americans Act and its regulations, SOFA has set priorities for program directions during the initial program period.

Area Agencies on Aging **must** utilize the funds available under Title III-F of the Older Americans Act to provide appropriate services to **older Americans age 60+** as described below:

#### **A. Approvable Services:**

Only the following disease prevention and health promotion services are approvable under this program:

- o Health Promotion Programs: including programs relating to chronic disabling conditions such as osteoporosis and cardio-vascular disease, prevention and reduction of effects of alcohol and substance abuse, smoking cessation, weight loss and control and stress management;
- o Home Injury Control Services: including screening of high-risk home environments and educational programs on injury prevention and fall and fracture prevention in the home setting;
- o Preventive Nutrition Services: including nutritional counseling and educational services for individuals and their primary caregivers;
- o Medication Management: screening and education to prevent incorrect medication usage and adverse drug reactions;
- o Routine Health Screening: which may include hypertension, glaucoma, cholesterol, cancer, diabetes and nutrition, vision and hearing screening;

- o Mental Health Services: screening for the prevention of depression, and referral to psychiatric and psychological services;
- o Physical Fitness Programs: including those conducted on an individual and group basis; and,
- o Medicare Preventive Services: educational programs on the availability, benefits, appropriate use of preventive health services covered under Title XVIII of the Social Security Act.

B. Approvable Providers/Facilities:

Due to economies of scale, the capacity to reach large numbers of participants and the accessibility of congregate programs, only the following providers/facilities are approvable under this program:

- o Multi-purpose Senior Centers which shall be defined as those facilities which serve as a community focal point where older adults come together for services and activities that reflect their diverse needs and interest, enhance their dignity, support their independence and encourage their involvement in the community.
- o Congregate Meal Sites which shall be defined as those nutrition sites which serve a meal under Title III-C-1 of the Older Americans Act or the State funded Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program and which have the capacity to provide other social and supportive activities.

If an Area Agency can document that the need for Title III-F approvable services provided through these approvable providers/facilities has been fully met, it can make a separate request for consideration to include other types of providers.

C. Target Population To Be Served

Area Agencies on Aging shall give priority in establishing these programs in areas within their planning and service area in which there are large numbers of older individuals who have the greatest economic and social need for such services and where there is a lack of medical/health facilities and a large population of medically underserved elderly. Consistent with existing Federal and State targeting policies, particular attention should be given to meeting the needs of low-income minority populations.

D. Program Period

Given the late date of receipt of these funds, the program period for Title III-F in 1993 will start on 5/1/93 and end on 12/31/93. Thereafter, the program will operate on a January through December program period.

E. Matching Requirements

Title III-F funds require a minimum of 10% in non-federal matching funds and cannot be used for Area Plan Administration.

F. Prohibition Against Direct Services

Area Agencies are reminded about the prohibition concerning the provision of direct services and the requirement that SOFA approval must be obtained before a AAA can provide any direct services.

**IV. Planning For The Use Of Title III-F Funds**

In planning for the use of its Title III-F funds, Area Agencies should consider the following planning guidance:

- o Funds provided to Area Agencies under Title III-F can not be used to pay for services if payment can be made under Title XVIII of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. 1395 et. seq.).
- o Other existing community resources from the voluntary sector, such as hospitals and mental health agencies or service clubs/organizations currently utilized to support the costs of such services allowable under the Title III-F Program, must be continued.
- o This funding is to be used by the Area Agency to fund new and creative ideas and to fill gaps and needs not currently being provided free through the voluntary sector or already provided through other funding streams such as Title III-C funded nutrition counseling and education.
- o Where program participants are currently contributing towards the cost of a program or service, these type of contributions should continue and Title III-F funds should not now provide the particular program or service for free.
- o To assist AAA's in planning and delivering quality services, the New York State Conference for the Aging and the New York City Council of Senior Centers and Services will be providing some training and technical assistance related to health promotion activities through senior centers.

**V. Allocation Formula and Schedule**

Our Office has received Title III-F allotments for both FFY 1992 and FFY 1993. In accordance with the Older Americans Act (OAA), these funds are being allocated using the Intrastate Funding Formula (IFF). Under the OAA statute and Federal Regulations, the IFF, as it applies to Title III-F, must give priority to areas of the State which are medically underserved and in which there are large numbers of individuals who have the greatest economic and social need for Title III-F services.

**Medically underserved means** those areas in New York State which have been designated by the Department of Health and Human Services and the U.S. Public Health Service as areas which lack the appropriate number of physicians and/or health care facilities in relation to the population of such areas. In applying the IFF for Title III-F funds, our Office has given priority to the medically underserved Planning and Service Areas (PSA's) in two ways. In calculating Weighted Population Percentages, only those factors that reflect economic or social need were included for the PSA's that are **not** medically underserved while all factors were included for the PSA's that are medically underserved. In addition, a higher Minimum Base Allocation was given to the PSA's that are medically underserved.

**Attached is a schedule which reflects the Weighted Population Percentage calculations for Title III-F.** In the second column entitled "MEDICALLY UNDERSERVED?", a "1" means the PSA is medically underserved and a blank means the PSA is **not** medically underserved. The 60-plus population is only a factor in determining the Weighted Population Percentages for the PSA's which are medically underserved.

**Also attached are the FFY 1992 Title III-F Final Allocation Schedule, the FFY 1993 Title III-F Final Allocation Schedule and a Combined Allocation Schedule for FFY 1992 & FFY 1993.** The FFY 1992 allocations were calculated using the Title III-F Weighted Population Percentages and Minimum Base Allocations which would result in final allocations of \$10,000 for the smallest medically underserved PSA's and \$9,500 for the smallest non-medically underserved PSA's. For FFY 1993, the allocations were calculated using the Title III-F Weighted Population Percentages and the Prior Year Allocations (i.e., FFY 1992 allocations). As specified in the IFF, the Minimum Base Allocations for FFY 1993 are the same as the Prior Year Allocations since our Title III-F allotment decreased from FFY 1992 to FFY 1993.

Since the FFY 1992 and FFY 1993 Title III-F funds were both awarded for obligation during FFY 1993, our Office is only requiring each Area Agency to complete a single application for its combined 1992 and 1993 allocations. These amounts are reflected in the last column on the Combined Allocation Schedule. In the future, our Office will only receive a single Title III-F allotment during a Federal Fiscal Year. Therefore, in planning Title III-F activities, the Area Agencies need to keep in mind that future allocations may only be about half of the amount available for the initial program period. Therefore, consideration should be given to using half of the current funding for one-time expenditures where appropriate.

## **VI. Action Needed**

Area Agencies on Aging should complete five copies of this application. **At least one copy of the application must bear an original signature.**

Area Agencies that **do not wish to apply** for these FFY 92-93 Title III-F funds should send a brief letter to SOFA stating that no funds are requested. Such letters must be submitted to OSSD by 3/12/93.


